Circle one picture and describe why you chose it.**



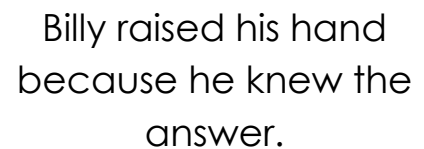
Alexander played with his dad's pocket watch.
